100 YEARS OF KEEPING TIME (1922-2022)

James (Jim) Jarvis, a longtime Montana resident and historian, has compiled a graphically rich chronology of the development of the Virginia City heritage tourism experience. A 100-year long account of the serendipitous events and cooperative efforts by various individuals, groups, and agencies responsible for the creation of the Virginia City National Historic Landmark and one of Montana's most popular heritage tourism attractions. The author has spent the last 25 years living, working, and studying this unique story.

In 1863, in a remote valley in southwestern Montana known as Alder Gulch, one of the largest placer gold deposits in the continental United States, was discovered and a classic gold-rush began. A discovery so rich that it took over 60 years to fully exhaust using the best-available, mining technology of the period. By the 1920s, however, the rich gold deposits of Alder Gulch were playing out, and its principal settlement, Virginia City was starting to resemble a ghost town – more dead than alive. At this point, the story took an interesting turn. The few remaining residents of Virginia City, recognizing that the era of mining-related prosperity was quickly coming to an end, and the very survival of the community was





ALLEN AND MILLARD BANK



he Federal Reserve Bank of Montana identifies the Allen and Millard Bank, which opened here in 1864, as the first real bank in Montana Territory. While other businesses in the territory called themselves banks, most were actually express companies that exchanged gold for cash or offered storage space in their safes.

ALLEN AND MILLARD CONT. ON PAGE 3 Allen and Millard, in fact, had the power to write drafts on a New York bank. The building itself, beautifully maintained, is one of Virginia City's oldest and best-preserved stone buildings. Although the original French doors and tall, narrow windows were replaced circa 1900, the front façade features the original ashlar stone, bracketed wooden cornice, and wooden window heads, allowing the building to retain its 1860s appearance. The bank operated as Hall and Bennett into the early 1900s and then became the Madison State Bank, which did business until 1930.

HIGHLIGHTED PROPERTY

Tootle, Leach & Company Warehouse

Acurious stone structure fronts Idaho Street with a collapsed roof with only remnants of its previous self-remaining. Located at 216 West Idaho on the south side of the street on privately owned property, it is set as a lone ghost of a commercial-type building with its character hard to discern. A quick dive into the Final Report of the Architectural, Historical and Archaeological Inventory of the Virginia City National Register Historic Landmark (Dames and Moore Report) written by Paul D. Friedman of Dames and Moore Engineering Company and dated August


9, 1990, begins to shed light on its purpose. The original owner was Tootle, Leach and Company who, as stated in the document, "...was a mercantile firm established in Virginia City in 1863. Their main store was on the corner of Idaho and Jackson Streets adjacent to this warehouse." One of the first businesses to open in Virginia City, Tootle, Leach & Company, supplied some of the finest goods in town and the basics as well. Their time at the corner of Idaho and Jackson Streets was short lived however, moving

their storefront to the more visible, newly constructed, Pfouts building (1865) storefront on Wallace Street by 1867. The 50' by 25' one-story stone warehouse building originally with dirt roof continued to serve as a warehouse and was noted as such on early Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps (1884) and subsequent maps later.

A large portion of the north facing façade and remnants of the east wall are all that remain of the building noted as contributing to the Virginia City National Historic Landmark District. The rectilinear cut stones, most likely cut from the local quarry up the hill to the northeast of town and located near the Bozeman Trail, were laid with linear coursing set in a wide buff colored mortar with a coarse aggregate. Stones with visible iron rusting are loosely laid comprising the top courses of remaining stone. A timber lintel spans a wide, wood-framed opening that appears to have once contained a pair of doors built of vertical wood planks. Fronting on Idaho Street, this large entrance would have easily provided a loading and unloading area giving easy access to stored mercantile inventory. Historically, Its stone construction and dirt roof provided a relatively fire-resistant construction type keeping its contents safe. Placer miner and stone mason Stephen J. Gainan constructed the building in 1864 for the mercantile company. Just a mere eight years later, Toole and Leach had dissolved their partnership and had moved on from Virginia City.




